GEO 299: The People and Places in the Modern Middle East

Course Description:

The Middle East region as the birth place of the three major monolithic religions; Judaism, Christianity and Islam, home to most of the world's oil reserves, and where the US is involved in a costly war is undoubtedly of vital interest to the West in general and the US in particular. Yet to majority of us, the region is veiled in mystery and its politics a source of confusion for most. In this course, we will explore the geopolitical importance of the area to the West. The course will focus on modern Middle East; its boundaries redrawn after the end of the World War I, the vanished countries and communities, the 'new' nation-states. The course will examine current Middle Eastern conflicts in their historic contexts with an emphasis on understanding its people and the geography of the region. The goal of the course is to familiarize the learners with modern Middle East; a combination of vibrant, diverse and dissimilar societies.
